With the soccer season finished, we would like to introduce track and field as the fourth quarter sport. This year, there will be a total of ten events. This includes: 100 M, 200 M, 400 M, 800 M, 1600 M, 4X100 Relay, 4X400 Relay, Long Jump, High Jump, and Shot Put. There has been a change to the previous system of weight/height class (A, B, C, D), and the events are now divided between 6th, 7th, and 8th grade.



In order to participate, the following is required: Parent Permission Slip, Emergency Contact Form, and a Current Sports Physical. These can be picked up and turned in to the office. It is also important to note that you must have passing grades, and as always good sportsmanship.



SPACE TRIANGLE

Recently there was an image captured by the Hubble Space Telescope of an odd triangle shape in space. This triangle is caused by the two galaxies NGC 2445 and NGC 2444 crashing together which is now called Arp 143. The collision was head-on meaning that a ring of new stars was created. According to Astronomer Julianne Dalcanton, new rings of stars aren't uncommon; the way that Arp 143 is shaped is unusual. A theory as to why Arp 143 is shaped like a triangle is as said by Dalcanton, "NGC 2444 may also have an invisible hot halo of gas that could help to pull NGC 2445's gas away from its nucleus.



Therefore, they're not completely free of each other yet, and their unusual interaction is distorting the ring into this triangle." The two galaxies are pulling apart from each other and within them hold both newer stars that are a few million years old and stars that are much older ranging near 100 million years old.
